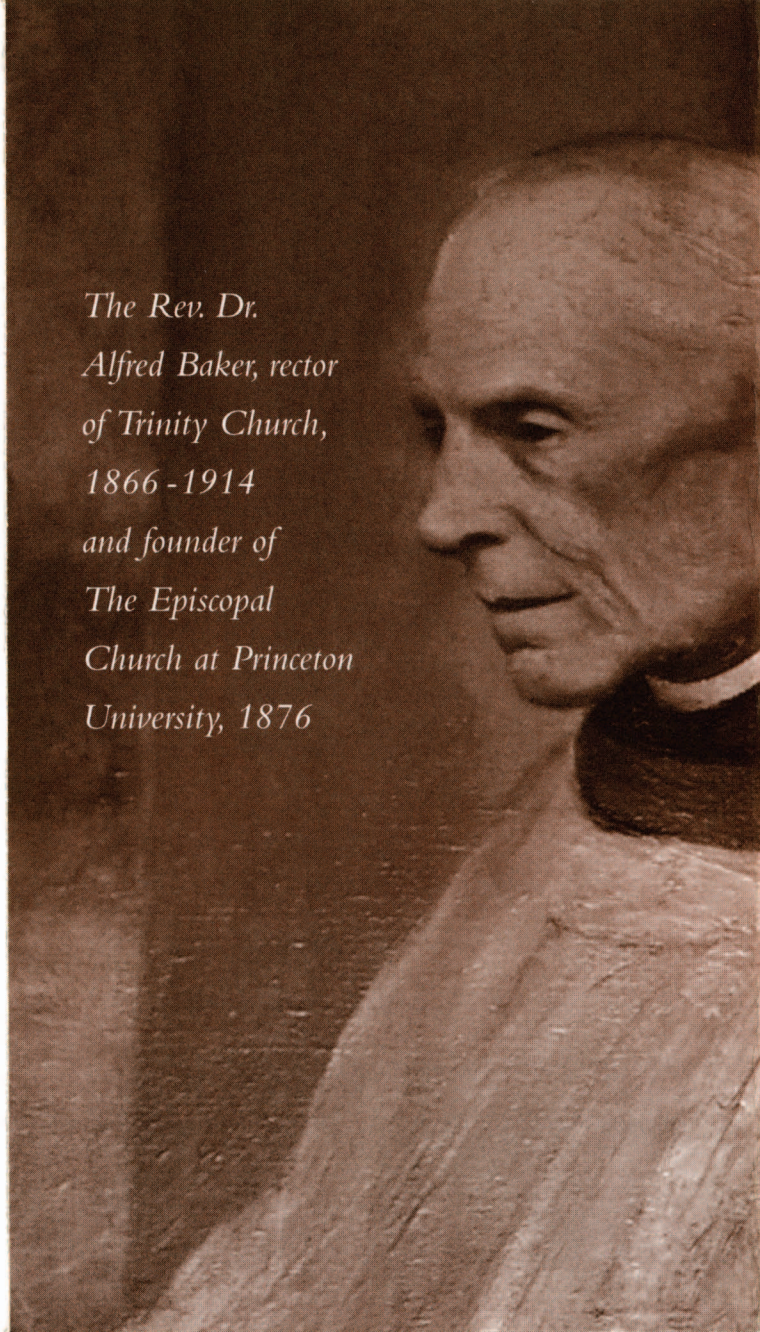


**T**he Rev. Dr. Alfred Baker, a graduate of the class of 1863, served as Rector of Trinity Church in Princeton from 1866–1914. During that time, he formed the Rector's Aid Society, a group of students that helped to start mission churches throughout New Jersey. Shortly after Dr. Baker's death, Bishop Matthews and his wife formed the Procter Foundation to perpetuate Rev. Dr. Baker's legacy of worship, service and ministry on the Princeton University campus.
